WORKS IN PROGRESS

A paper on hate speech and First Amendment exceptions (under review)

• This paper argues that when uttered in public accommodations, racist hate speech denies targets full and equal access to those accommodations and is therefore undeserving of First Amendment protections under the precedent that speech integral to illegal conduct is unprotected.

"What's Missing in Interest-Based Theories of Rights" (in-progress)

• I argue that interest-based theories cannot account for the categorical nature of rights nor the directionality of duties they create. However, I propose that pairing such theories with considerations of legitimacy can resolve both problems

"Is It Permissible to Believe Asymmetric Algorithms?"

• This paper argues that under certain conditions, it's both epistemically permissible and perhaps required to believe recidivism risk algorithms that disproportionately but accurately identify members of some racial group as high risk.
