I develop an account of the veridicality conditions of perceptual experience, in a way that solves the Puzzle of Temporal Experience. I claim that perceptual experience has minimal temporal content: it contains no indexical element, it is unit-free and there is no perceptual representation of an event's duration. I develop an epistemological account of perceptual justification, such that, based on this minimal temporal content one can be justified in making perceptual judgements. I contribute to the current literature by providing a new solution to a widely discussed philosophical puzzle.
