Dissertation: Metaphysical Foundations of Modality: The Source of Necessity

The primary aim of this research project is to discover the source of the necessity that makes necessary truths necessarily true. I begin by examining and critiquing accounts of the source of necessity that claim we, humans, are in some way or other responsible for making necessary truths necessarily true (i.e. dependent accounts of the source of necessity). I then advance my own non-dependent account of the source of necessity – i.e. an account that does not claim we, humans, are responsible for making necessary truths necessarily true – that I am calling the "Actual-world Grounding Account."
