*Creating and Raising Humans: Essays on the Morality of Procreation and Parenting.*

Abstract. It used to be widely held that procreation does not need a justification, that its moral permissibility is simply obvious. But a number of arguments from Benatar, Shiffrin and Velleman have challenged common sense on this score. In response to this background, my dissertation offers the beginnings of the first systematic defense of procreation, one that consists in four articles. Along the way implications are drawn for parenting, bioethics, happiness research, normative ethics, and the non-identity problem.
