CityLAB – Semester in Residence at the City of Hamilton

During a four month period at CityLAB, my group and I worked with CityHousing Hamilton to develop a Green Living workshop manual for CityHousing residents at 226 Rebecca (a senior's home). The manual, created using qualitative research methods and data from 226 Rebecca residents, is intended to help facilitate workshops pertaining to waste and energy management in different CityHousing units. The manual is geared toward lowering energy usage rates used by CityHousing buildings and to create a "greener" city. Other associated projects included: creating Green Living Playing Cards (a regular playing card deck with energy and recycling facts on each card) translated into Arabic, Simplified Chinese and English to accommodate language needs (~quarter of 226 Rebecca residents were non-English speaking) and a workshop with residents where we played games such as Jeopardy with recycling and energy facts.

My group members and I presented our final project to the following venues and groups: 1. CityLAB project showcase, in front of the Mayor of Hamilton, as well as other prominent city officials and residents; 2. Board of Directors of CityHousing; 3. Municipal-Education Meeting at the David Braley Health Sciences Centre, to the Dean of McMaster University, Dean of Science at McMaster University, City Councillors, and the Mayor of Hamilton.
