DISSERTATION SUMMARY

In this dissertation, I argue that knowledge depends on trust and that abuses of trust destroy knowledge. Focusing on abuses of trust in disinformation campaigns and echo chambers, I examine how these cases involve relationships that destroy the underlying conditions for knowledge. After reviewing the literature on epistemic dependence and trust, I examine political and industry disinformation campaigns to show how they undermine the credibility of received knowledge and expert views. I then examine abuses of trust within echo chambers, communities that are closed off from information that discredits their views. I argue against a prominent account of what makes echo chambers epistemically unhealthy and provide my own alternative account of what distinguishes epistemically healthy from unhealthy communities. My view depends crucially on my account of epistemic nihilism. In my view, epistemically pernicious communities use authority to incite a general distrust of received knowledge that is ultimately self-defeating. Finally, I offer a view of how social media platforms contribute to abusing trust by explaining their roles in forming trust networks and spreading disinformation. My research is the first to argue for a network model of collective epistemic responsibility. My view is contrasted to both individualistic models of epistemic responsibility—according to which knowers have a duty to be epistemically virtuous in their pursuit of knowledge—and interpersonal models—according to which the responsibility of groups to their audiences is modeled on testimony. Instead, I argue that the credibility of knowledge claims is determined by a network of individuals, groups, and institutions that corroborate the claim, and as such, the network is the proper locus of responsibility. My research challenges prominent assumptions in social epistemology and ethics about the nature of epistemic groups, the causes of widespread distrust of knowledge, and diagnoses of epistemic perniciousness in groups such as echo chambers.
