abstract: My dissertation systematically investigates *truth-aptness defeat*: evidence that your belief (credence, etc.) is *empty*—that is, that it lacks a propositional content. For example: if you believe that Mary is in New York, evidence that there is no such person as "Mary" will indicate that that belief is empty. (Other examples may include evidence that your belief makes a category mistake, or deploys some non-factual vocabulary.) Truth-aptness defeat does not rationalize lowering credence, even though it makes your credence less likely to be true. Instead, reflection on truth-aptness shows that there must be a heretofore unnoticed dimension along which we can adjust our credences, even credence *i*, and along which we should adjust them upon receiving truth-aptness defeat. I call this dimension how *firmly* you *hold* an attitude. This dimension is *sui generis*, and all of our attitudes (desire, fear, etc.) can vary along it. Hence, my dissertation uncovers an entirely new dimension of the mind.
